





WORKSHOP GROWTH








ASSESSING IMPACT

How much of your food scraps are you currently composting?

Prior to attending a workshop 34% of survey respondents composted no food scraps at all. Six months after their workshop 62% composted three quarters to all of their food scraps.






FOOD WASTE DIVERTED FROM LANDFILL




Assumes 80% of a household's annual food waste is being composted in some way. So this multiplies kg per household by number of households composting.



COMMUNITY COMPOSTING HUB FUND

In 2021, Compost Collective launched the Compost Hub Fund Grant, issuing grants of up to \$500 to support community composting.


The grant was allocated in its entirety to 20 composting hubs in the region, and will continue into 2023.

Social media collaboration success



PREDATOR FREE NZ

Rodents are the number one reason people say they don't compost. Together with PFNZ, we came up with a week of content for social media and shared top tips daily on keeping compost rodent-free, a Q&A was linked to with advice and tips from our tutors, and ran a giveaway of a rat trap.





SHAREWASTE PROMOTION HIGHLIGHTS



Carla (CEO of EcoMatters) was interviewed on TVNZ Breakfast on Thursday 9 June. The feedback was great and the spike we saw on social media, ShareWaste NZ app downloads, and the Compost Collective website, was huge.




We have continued promotion of ShareWaste on social media, and have seen good results. There was a 188% rise in Android app downloads (525 downloads), and a 133% rise in Apple app downloads (800 downloads) across New Zealand, with users jumping up by around 2000, to 9,082, and map listings up by 344 to 1,190. Twelve of our social media posts were either about, or included ShareWaste, and continue to be amongst our posts with the highest engagement.



COMMUNITY COMPOSTING HUB FUND PROMOTION


We promoted the hub fund on our social media from its launch at the end of October. Recipients shared photos of their hub and how their money was spent on social media. This showed positive fund outcomes and inspired others to start their own, or join their local community hub.
