TĀMAKI MAKAURAU COMPOSTERS NETWORK



Compost Collective received funds from the Environmental Services
Department to support the re-establishment of an Auckland Composters
Network, a group that lost funding in 2019. In January of 2023 Waiheke
Resources Trust was contracted to coordinate this piece of work and
Kristin Busher came on as the lead coordinator.

A group of national composters met at the Strengthening Communities Hui in October 2022, and were engaging online. In order to support and engage with energy of this group, Cissy Rock from Community Think was engaged to run a series of three online workshops in February and March 2023. This group worked on a kaupapa/living vision document and established themselves as the ACN (Aotearoa Composters Network).

Tāmaki Makaurau Composters Networks (TMCN) sits as a regional arm of the Aotearoa Composters Network (ACN) and works to the Vision, Mission, Values and Strategic goals of the ACN.


In April 2023, a Tāmaki regional in-person hui was held and attended by 49 people from 36 organisations, with over 70 registrations in total. The attendees at this hui voted to adopt the name TMCN and on the allocation of the remaining funding. This was issued to a resourced working group, a storytelling/video content making project, a community compost survey, and support of a junior soilpreneur.










ASSESSING IMPACT

What have you changed since you've attended a workshop?

Since attending a composting workshop, 70% of survey participants started composting or improved their composting practice. The workshop positively impacted the waste habits of 94% of attendees.




Assumes 80% of a household's annual food waste is being composted in some way. So this multiplies kg per household by number of households composting.

In 2021, Compost Collective launched the Compost Hub Fund Grant, issuing grants of up to \$500 to support community composting.


The grant has continued this year and 17 hubs have used the funds to support their work.










SHARING SUCCESS STORIES

COMPOSTING HUBS IN ACTION

This year, with more of a focus on the community composting hubs around Auckland and the Community Composting Hub Fund, we ran a series of case studies on a few hubs. The stories included advice and tips, as well as how they used their grant money. These are a resource that can be shared and accessed by people in the beginning stages of their composting hub journeys, or those who need to troubleshoot, etc, along the way. There were many brilliant nuggets of advice captured.



BAYVIEW COMMUNITY CENTRE COMPOST HUB

Bayview Community Centre's composting journey started with a small compost set up in the garden, which wasn't thriving. The fund enabled them to purchase Bokashi bins, and aeration forks, as well as connecting them with a Compost Collective facilitator who gave them helpful advice to get up and running as a composting hub.



KAIPĀTIKI COMMUNITY COMPOSTING HUB

Kaipātiki Project on Auckland's North Shore run two community composting hubs. Each hub only accepts Bokashi, and each member needs to complete a Bokashi composting workshop with the Compost Collective. They used the fund to buy weighing scales, and other tools to measure the volume of waste and compost produced.



SOIL FACTORY, A COMMUNITY COMPOSTING HUB

Soil Factory runs a community composting hub at Ponsonby's Kelmarna Gardens. Local businesses and residents pay a monthly fee for their food scraps to be picked up from their homes and offices by bike. The fund covered new tools for composting, as well as equipment to measure inputs and outputs for data collection.
