





Did you know New Zealand households alone contribute the weight of 271 jumbo jets in food waste a year, with the value of \$100 million going to landfills?! ShareWaste NZ is an amazing way to literally share your food waste, and divert it from our landfills. You can receive or give your scraps, and connect with people near to you. There were many more social media mentions this past year of ShareWaste NZ, and we are seeing the results. We continue to build brand awareness and salience of ShareWaste in New Zealand, and continue to see the sign-up and engagement numbers rise.

Social media promotion includes specific ShareWaste social posts (two were among the posts with the most engagement, in quarter two and four), and promoting ShareWaste through conversations with individuals over private messaging and more general public composting posts.

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### ShareWaste Social Media Impact



We have seen a few conversions through our conversations on social media, for example, a user commented on a post about Bokashi saying they want to try it, but feel they don't have the space. By the end of the conversation, the user let us know they signed up, and connected with a host. ShareWaste NZ registrations were between 400 and 550 each quarter in 20/21, and website engagement rose from quarter two onwards, coinciding with more ShareWaste related social media mentions/posts. We also noticed a relationship between higher engaging ShareWaste social media posts, and increased interaction with the website.




### Assessing Impact

2020/21

How much of your food scraps are you currently composting?

Prior to attending a workshop 29% of survey respondents composted no food scraps at all. Six months after their workshop 63% composted three quarters to all of their food scraps.





# Social Media Highlights

While we have been actively promoting Compost Collective on the Compost Collective social media accounts, other individuals and groups have also talked about us positively.

We see the extent our tutors and online resources are reaching people with the mentions across social media, including Ministry for the Environment referring people to Compost Collective for information during International Compost Awareness Week, Talking Trash NZ's inclusion of The Compost Collective as a resource in their introduction to composting, and a ZeroWaste NZ group member asking for composting help, and a response given by us to them.

There are also unsolicited testimonials showing how the workshop programme is resonating, and how useful people are finding our online resources, including Bucklands Beach Playcentre thanking tutor Hari for a workshop on their Instagram, and a Twitter user praising the Compost Collective resources as the "best online", and sharing pictures of signage she made for her family for using their home compost system.

Reviewing new ways to engage with our audiences, we recorded three live social media recordings with tutors during the year, including two Facebook Lives (Pip's Spring Planting Season in September 2020 and Judy's Mataraki / New Beginnings in July 2020) and

an Instagram Live (Amanda introducing Community Composting Hubs).

This year we also recorded a short video introducing The Compost Collective, which we shared with much success across our social media, including it as the video that plays when people visit our YouTube channel, which we also tidied up to ensure it is a useful and easy to use composting resource.





# Highlights





#### PAPATOETOE COMMUNITY FOOD AND COMPOST HUB Supported by Pacific Vision Aotearoa

One of the great success stories this year has been the Papatoetoe Food Hub, whose story is featured on the Compost Collective website.

The Hub is two years old and started their composting journey in May 2020.

They are working closely with local businesses, farmers, and their community to reduce food waste locally. In just one three month period, they kept almost 3,000kg of food and garden waste out of landfill, and instead used it to create compost to nourish the soil in their gardens.

Composting is a great fit with their driving principle of 'whenua to whenua' - by rescuing food and making compost, they are closing the loop and giving back to nature.

Their community composting site is a powerful educational tool, as they believe the best way to encourage others is to show composting in action so people can see just how easy it is. They'd love to see more sites like theirs right around Auckland, to help locals keep food scraps out of landfill.



#### PROGRAMME DEVELOPMENT

We are further developing and expanding the Compost Collective programme in response to community need. Our core deliverable remains equipping people with the skills to compost successfully at home, but more often now our tutors are also working regularly alongside community groups to deepen practice.

Tutors are doing amazing work in their communities driving both new and ongoing engagement, to extend people's composting journey and expand their knowledge, so they can go to the next level. This can involve multiple visits to support and empower groups, so these groups in turn can increase their impact with composting. This work goes hand in hand with our drive to develop more community composting hubs, to provide options for those with the desire to compost but without the space or need for it themselves.

Our work to embed composting as a normal, easy part of everyday life is also getting noticed across Aotearoa. We are supporting other communities and local authorities with best practice on getting started with similar models and endorsing the use of the ShareWaste app nationwide. Already Nelson City Council and Tasman District Council are promoting the ShareWaste app to their residents.
